Public-Land Restrictions Possible

The Backcountry Horsemen of America is alerting trail users that wilderness-management agencies are trying to restrict the use of horses on public lands, while the United States Forest Service is planning new trail classifications that might limit trail riders' activities. Also, a new bill could eliminate the current fees for accessing undeveloped federal land. Through its Wilderness Committee, the BCHA advises state organizations in their efforts with public-lands managers to keep the backcountry open to stock use. 


