- Control the spread of animal disease
- Assure that trucks & trailers transporting livestock meet Idaho's vehicle safety standard

DO I NEED TO STOP AT AN IDAHO PORT OF ENTRY?



You sure do!

Idaho Code 45-511 states:

- All vehicles over 10,000 pounds carrying livestock must stop at ports of entry and roving ports. This requirement applies to every one – not just commercial Haulers.

Idaho Code 25-214A states:

- All vehicles entering Idaho with livestock must stop at a port of entry or a roving check station. That applies to everyone, regardless of vehicle weight.

WHAT ANIMALS ARE CONSIDERED "LIVESTOCK"?

Idaho defines livestock as:

- Equine (*horses, asses, & mules*)
- Cattle
- Bison
- Swine
- Sheep & Goats
- Domestic Cervidae (*deer & elk*)
- Camelidae (*llama, alpacas, camels, etc.*)
- Rattles (*ostrich, emu, & rheat*)

WHAT PAPERWORK DO I NEED?

All livestock entering the state must be accompanied in transit by:

- An official health certificate (*except livestock destined for an approved livestock market*)
- Documentation of ownership (*another state's brand inspection, pure breed registration, or health papers*)

All equine & cattle leaving the state must be accompanied by:

- A brand inspection
- A health certificate (*additionally, equine are required to have a negative Coggins test.*)
- All equine must have a negative Coggins test unless ISDA Animal Health has a reciprocal agreement with a neighboring border state. Check with Animal Health at (208) 332-8540.
