The Roadless Rule (2001 Roadless Area Conservation Rule) is a federal regulation that protects roughly 58.5 million acres of inventoried roadless areas on National Forest lands across the U.S. Here's what it does:



Core Protections

- Prohibits road construction and reconstruction in designated roadless areas — no new roads can be built
- Bans most commercial timber harvesting in those areas
- Applies to about one-third of all National Forest land — the largest land protection action in U.S. history at the time



What It Does NOT Restrict

- Non-motorized recreation — hiking, horseback riding, and pack/saddle stock use are generally allowed
- Existing roads and trails — only new construction of permanent is regulated
- Grazing, hunting, and fishing generally continue

Travel Management Rule Revision (36 CFR 212)

Notice of Intent (NOI) Published

Comment Period:

August 21, 2026 - Sep 23, 2026 (11:59 PM EDT)

Proposed amendment to 36 CFR 212 is the Forest Service's regulation governing **administration of the forest transportation system**—including roads, trails, and motor. It establishes how the agency **plans, designates, manages, and maintains** the transportation network and how it decides **where motor vehicles are allowed**.

- Transportation Planning:** Requires each national forest to identify the minimum road system needed for safe, efficient management while protecting natural resources. It covers road maintenance, decommissioning, and access rights (including private easements).
- Travel Management (Motor Vehicle Use):** Requires forests to designate **specific roads, trails, and areas** where motor vehicles are allowed. These designations must be shown on a **Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM)**. All other areas are closed to public motorized use unless specifically designated.

Overall, **36 CFR 212 is the legal backbone** for how the Forest Service manages motorized access, ensures environmental protection, and provides consistent, enforceable travel rules across all national forests.

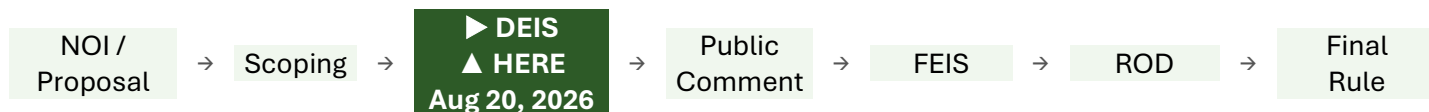

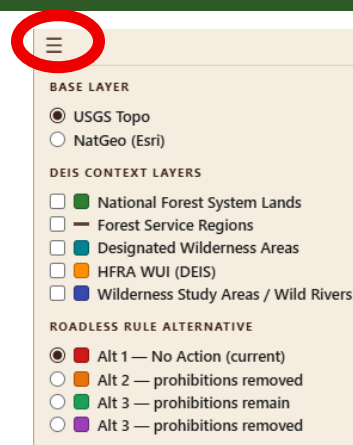

Quality comments on a Roadless Rule Draft EIS

Effective comments focus on **substance**, not volume. Agencies are required to consider comments that raise **specific issues**, provide **new information**, or identify **gaps** in the analysis. Strong comments typically:

- **Identify specific sections** of the Draft EIS and explain what is missing, unclear, or inaccurate.
- **Provide facts, data, or local knowledge** that the agency may not have included. Personal experience with roadless areas is considered valuable information.
- **Explain environmental, cultural, economic, or recreational impacts** of the proposed action, using concrete examples.
- **Suggest reasonable alternatives or modifications**, including mitigation measures.
- **Avoid form-letter language** unique comments carry more weight in the record.



Travel Regulations Scoping Overview

The Forest Service is rewriting **national access and travel regulations** for all National Forests and Grasslands. This rule will replace the 2005 Travel Management Rule and reshape how roads, trails, closures, motorized use, over-snow vehicles, airfields, and access decisions are made for decades.

This notice officially **starts the rulemaking process** and announces a full **Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)**. What the public says now will determine what issues and alternatives the agency is legally required to analyze.

Travel Regulations Scoping

- **Scoping** is the first—and most influential—stage of the NEPA process. It tells the Forest Service:
- **What issues must be analyzed** (access, safety, wildlife, water, recreation conflicts, mapping accuracy, etc.)
- **What alternatives must be considered**
- **What data, studies, and evidence must be used**
- **What impacts matter to the public** If an issue is **not raised during scoping**, the agency can legally ignore it later.

Scoping shapes the entire EIS and ultimately the final national rule.

Why You Should Comment Now

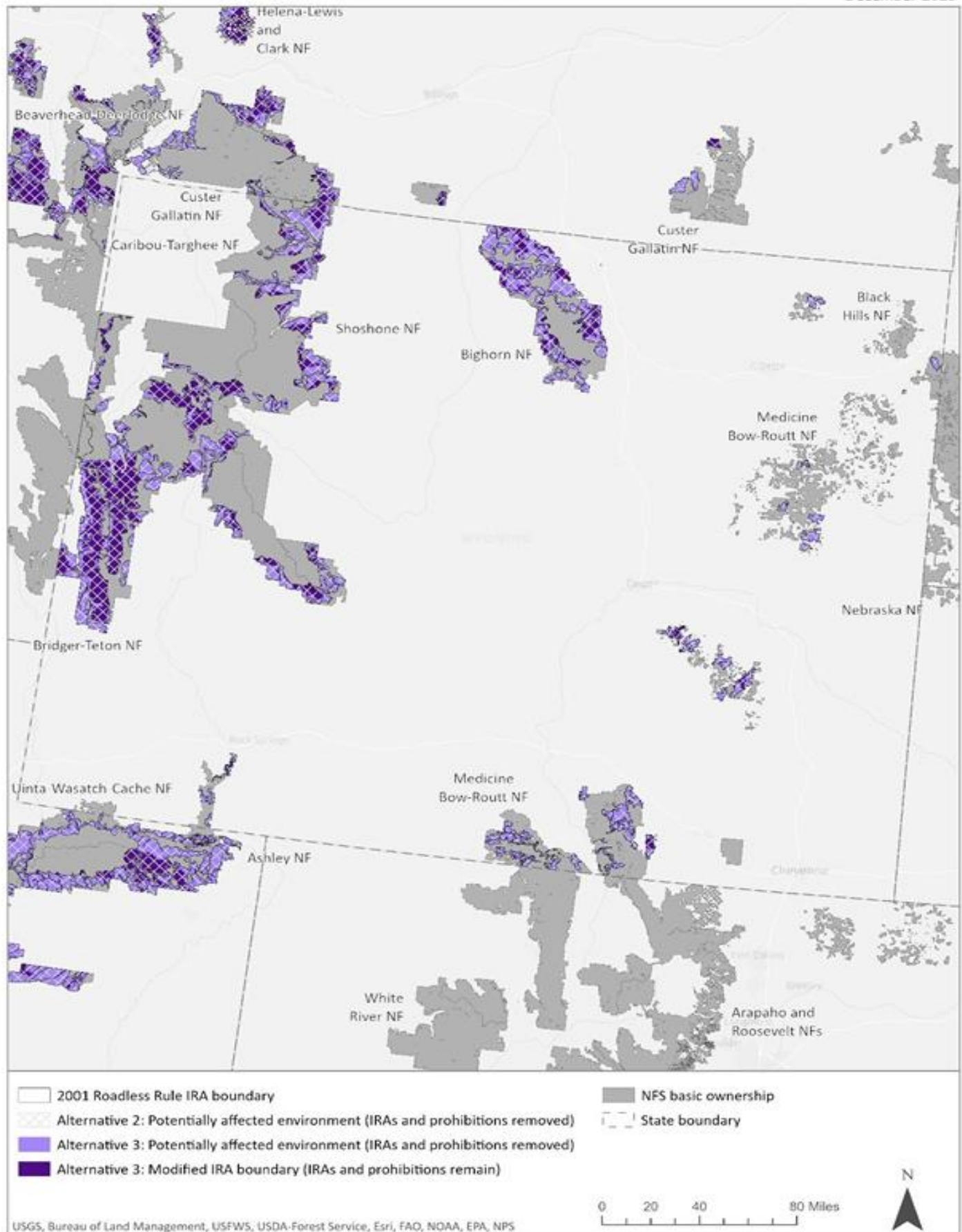
- This rule will determine **where people can drive, ride, hike, bike, or use stock** on National Forests.
- It changes how forests justify **closures, restrictions, and designations**.
- It affects **volunteer access**, trail maintenance, safety, and recreation planning.
- It sets national policy for **motorized and non-motorized use** for the next 20+ years.
- Early comments have the **highest impact** on the final rule.
